Maharaja Agrasen College (MAC), in just three decades since its inception, has emerged as one of India's premier institutions for higher education in the Arts, Science, and Commerce streams. With a commitment to academic excellence and allround development, the college has consistently excelled in academics, sports, extracurricular achievements, and faculty advancement. It proudly retained its NAAC Grade 'A' in the 2022 cycle, reflecting its unwavering pursuit of quality education.

In the recent national survey by the India Today Group and MDRA, MAC was ranked 23th in Science, 26th in Arts, and 35th in Commerce—a testament to its growing prominence. Furthermore, its inclusion among the top 50 institutions in the National Institutional Ranking Framework (2022) by the Ministry of Education stands as a marker of its excellence. This success is driven by a dedicated faculty that integrates cutting-

edge research and innovative pedagogies to nurture young minds.

The college remains at the forefront of educational innovation, constantly adapting to the latest technologies and teaching methodologies to foster a holistic learning environment. FACILITIES

ICT Centre

The Centre supports the e-curriculum needs of computer-based practical oriented subjects across various courses offered by the college. In addition, it operates a dedicated general-purpose computer lab, accessible to faculty, students, and administrative staff for their computing requirements at their convenience. This lab offers a diverse technological environment, equipped with Windows 7, MacOS, and Linux operating systems. A secure Wi-Fi network is also provided by the Centre, ensuring seamless internet access for all members of the college community.

Media Lab

The College houses a fully equipped Media Centre, featuring high-definition technology and in-house professional expertise to provide comprehensive training in both pre-production and post-production for Journalism students. In addition to academic instruction, the Centre serves as a hub for film screenings, short filmmaking workshops, and seminars or conferences focused on diverse facets of media and journalism. Hallmarked by Live Projects and active Industry Interface programmes, the Media Centre plays a pivotal role in bridging classroom learning with real-world media experience. The College also collaborates with industry partners to host various events under the aegis of the Centre.

Sardar Vallabhbhai Patel Auditorium



Housed in a dedicated three-storey complex, the state-of-the-art auditorium stands as a cornerstone of the College's cultural and extracurricular landscape. With a seating capacity of 700, it is named in honour of Sardar Vallabhbhai Patel, the Iron Man of India, and serves as the primary venue for the institution's most significant academic and cultural engagements.

The auditorium has played host to a range of distinguished events, including the Swami Vivekanand Memorial Annual Lecture Series, the Sardar Vallabhbhai Patel Memorial Annual Lecture Series, Dr. APJ Abdul Kalam Popular Science Lecture Series, and YUVAAN, the college's annual cultural festival. It has also welcomed international artistry through SPIC MACAY

programs, featuring performances by acclaimed groups such as Polish traditional music and dance ensembles, Indo-Georgian cultural exchange programmes, and the Italian band Kora Beat.

Over the years, several eminent personalities have addressed the student community from its stage—among them, former Vice President of India Shri M. Venkaiah Naidu, the former Hon'ble Governor of Gujarat Shri O.P. Kohli, reverberated with the performances of Pt. Hariprasad Chaurasia, Kathak maestro Dr. Shovana Narayan, etc.

Conference Room



The college's ultra-modern Conference Room is outfitted with advanced facilities, including a large ultra-high-resolution interactive panel, superior sound system, overhead projector, and other state-of-the-art technological tools. This cutting-edge infrastructure has enabled the seamless organization of both national and international conferences, as well as a series of Student Congresses and academic presentations.

Vidyottama Girls' Hostel



Vidyottama, the Girls' Hostel of Maharaja Agrasen College, provides a safe, secure, and comfortable residential environment for female students. Spread across three floors, the hostel accommodates 58 residents, with designated dining facilities located on the ground floor. Each floor is equipped with a pantry featuring a water cooler, washing machine, microwave, induction stove, ironing amenities, and other essential conveniences.



Admissions are granted strictly on the basis of merit, in adherence to the prevailing reservation norms. Prospective outstation students are advised to visit the college website—www.mac.du.ac.in—regularly for the latest updates and details regarding hostel admissions and related procedures.

Sports Facilities



Maharaja Agrasen College offers a comprehensive array of sports facilities, along with professional coaching and training in disciplines such as Athletics, Archery, Basketball, Badminton, Chess, Cricket, Cycling, Soccer, Korfball, Softball, Volleyball, and Wushu. The College Sports Committee oversees all sporting activities and regularly organises a wide range of sports and adventure programs for students, faculty, and non-teaching staff alike.

A major highlight is the annual inter-college sports festival SPARDHA, which fosters healthy competition and camaraderie across institutions. To further promote

physical wellness, the College houses a fully equipped gymnasium—the MAC Wellness Centre—accessible to all students and staff during morning hours. For hostel residents, the facility remains available during the evenings as well, offering greater flexibility.

Looking ahead, the College envisions several new developments to expand its fitness infrastructure:

Library



At MAC, the Library serves as an intellectually vibrant hub, fostering cognitive growth and academic exploration. Spanning two floors, it offers a thoughtfully designed environment with comfortable seating for both students and faculty. The collection boasts over 44,668 books, approximately 135,000 e-books (accessible via login), and more than 5,000 e-journals, along with a rich array of digital resources in Science and Technology, Social Sciences, Arts and Humanities, Commerce, and Management.

The Library also houses an audio-visual collection of around 200 CDs and DVDs. Fully automated through KOHA—an open-source integrated library management system, it is seamlessly organized and user-friendly. Subscriptions

to N-LIST (National Library and Information Services Infrastructure for Scholarly Content) and the Delhi University Library System (DULS) further extend access to thousands of e-resources through secure login credentials.

Smart Class Rooms



Maharaja Agrasen College took a significant step toward advancing next-generation pedagogy by establishing six state-of-the-art smart classrooms on its campus. Aligned with the college's vision of delivering holistic and high-quality education, these classrooms have transformed the teaching-learning environment into a more dynamic and inclusive space.

Equipped with real-time e-learning tools—such as audio-visual aids, multimedia content, online conferences, PowerPoint presentations, and 2D and 3D animations,

these classrooms have enriched both virtual and physical learning experiences. This modern setup seamlessly integrates traditional classroom methods with digital platforms, making education more accessible, interactive, and engaging for all students.

'Sahastradhara'—A Nexus of Thought and Learning

Inaugurated on January 15, 2025, Sahastradhara stands as a vibrant confluence of diverse intellectual streams—a space envisioned by the College to foster critical thinking and meaningful dialogue among students. Conceived in alignment with the principles of NEP 2020, this informal, open learning environment recognises the transformative potential of experiential education beyond traditional classrooms.

CELLS/CENTRES

To enrich this dynamic space, several thoughtfully designed features have been introduced: a herbal garden, yoga and meditation parks, vermi and anaerobic composting pits, organic farming beds, seedling plots, a dedicated sowing area, a polyhouse, and a gazebo. Together, these elements cultivate not only ecological awareness but also serve as micro-learning centres tailored to the needs of Skill Enhancement Courses (SEC) and Value-Added Courses (VAC), offering immersive, hands-on learning opportunities.

Himalayan Study Circle: Exploring the Spirit of the Mountains

Established in August 2022, the Himalayan Study Circle (HSC@MAC) was envisioned as a multi-disciplinary initiative dedicated to the exploration of Himalayan ecology and cultural heritage. Affiliated with the Centre for Himalayan Studies, University of Delhi, the Study Circle engages in research spanning Himalayan history, geography, society, economy, polity, culture, traditional knowledge, bio-resources, environment, and sustainable development.

Its engagements include:

- Fortnightly discussions on diverse themes: geomorphology, cultural landscapes, biodiversity, habitats, and regional traditions
- Documentary screenings featuring globally acclaimed ecological and cultural narratives
- Nature walks and field visits to biodiversity parks, national parks, and wildlife sanctuaries
- Annual Himalayan Festival, celebrated at both college and university levels
- Compilation of an Anthology on Himalayan Culture, capturing the multifaceted essence of the region

Through these activities, HSC@MAC nurtures a spirit of inquiry, appreciation, and preservation, and verbalises the majestic Himalayas into the academic and cultural life of the institution.

College Publications

The academic community at Maharaja Agrasen College recognises the importance of fostering in-house publications as a means of encouraging scholarly and creative expression. Among its notable initiatives is *The Indian Journal of Social Enquiry*, a distinguished research journal that has secured a prominent place in the landscape of academic publishing across the country.

The Department of Business Economics contributes to this vibrant culture through its annual publication, BEAM, which serves as a platform for students to articulate their academic insights and engage with contemporary business trends. Similarly, the Department of Journalism regularly brings out its newsletter, MAC VOICE, while the Department of English publishes Edges, a creative writing journal dedicated to diverse student expressions. Remarkably, Edges is entirely conceptualised, edited, and designed by students, offering them a comprehensive understanding of the journalistic process from content creation to publication.

The college magazine, AGRANIKA, stands as a testament to the collective spirit of the college community. This magazine designed by the Magazine and Prospectus Committee of the college provides a vivid canvas for creativity and serves as a chronicle of the academic year. Published annually, AGRANIKA is formally released during the college's Annual Day celebration.

National Service Scheme (NSS)

The National Service Scheme (NSS) stands as a beacon of youth-driven social commitment, devoted to nurturing a sense of civic responsibility and service among students. Inspired by the guiding mantra ॐ सर्वे भवन्तु सुखिन: ("May all be happy") and harmonised









with the national ethos of "समरस भारत" and "एक भारत श्रेष्ठ भारत, NSS empowers young minds to contribute meaningfully toward building an inclusive, equitable society.

Ongoing Projects and Initiatives

- **Project ABHI (Agrasen Baroji Help Initiative):** MAC's NSS unit has adopted the villages of Baroji (Haryana) and Nistauli (U.P.) to advance rural development and empowerment. Through consistent field visits, volunteers educate residents about governance, civic rights, and self-reliance, ensuring the villagers are not merely recipients of help but function as active change-makers within their communities.
- **Project Akshar:** Focused on holistic education for underprivileged children in Dallupura and Kondli, this initiative blends academic support with lessons in life skills, hygiene, and confidence-building. Volunteers also host joyful community events like Diwali Melas and Children's Day celebrations to nurture emotional and social well-being.
- AAROGYA: A public health drive that raises awareness about preventive healthcare and encourages wellness-oriented habits among communities.
- **Swachhata:** Aligned with the Swachh Bharat Abhiyan initiated by the Government of India, this flagship program promotes environmental cleanliness through regular drives, waste management efforts, and awareness campaigns.
- AGRANI: Focused on empowering women, this initiative addresses gender inequality by creating opportunities for skill development, expression, and growth.
- **SYAAHI:** A creative platform where volunteers voice social messages through reflective writing to promote peace, equity, and shared humanity.
- **SANJAAL:** The tech wing of NSS, where volunteers harness digital tools to spread awareness via posters, reels, and online campaigns. This wing recognises the dynamic role of technology in influencing the masses to lead to a positive change in society.
- TASAVVUR: With artistry at its core, this wing breathes visual life into NSS causes. Volunteers craft impactful posters, props, and handmade installations to aesthetically enhance outreach efforts.

At its heart, NSS at MAC nurtures the emotion of humanity, weaving compassion and service into every initiative. With each thoughtful act, the unit shapes not just better communities, but also conscientious individuals—prepared to lead, uplift, and transform the world around them.

National Cadet Corps (NCC)

The National Cadet Corps (NCC) is a voluntary youth organization under the Indian Armed Forces, committed to shaping young individuals into disciplined and patriotic citizens. Our college unit, MAC-NCC, operates under the 3 Delhi Girls Battalion and currently comprises approximately 110 girl cadets.

Despite being a relatively new unit, MAC-NCC has demonstrated commendable enthusiasm and initiative. Our cadets actively participate in a variety of social and environmental initiatives, including cleanliness drives,





tree plantation campaigns, and the adoption and upkeep of public statues. The unit also organizes impactful events such as lectures, awareness talks, and commemorations of International Yoga Day, Environment Day, and other significant occasions.

In recent years, our cadets have proudly represented the unit in several prestigious national-level events and camps, including the All India Annual NCC Trek (Darjeeling and Ajmer), Prime Minister's Rally, Special National Integration Camp, Thal Sainik Camp, Independence Day Camp, Youth Exchange Program, Ek Bharat Shreshtha Bharat Camp, and Mountaineering Training Camp, among others.

CELLS/CENTRES

Regular institutional training is conducted on campus by dedicated GCIs and PI staff, ensuring that our cadets receive consistent guidance and skill development in alignment with NCC's core values.

The selection to NCC Girls will be undertaken after a round of interview and presentations. The details will be shared on the website in due course of time.

SC/ST/OBC Cell (As per UGC Guidelines)

NCWEB Centre – Empowering Girls' Education

The Non-Collegiate Women's Education Board (NCWEB) provides access to higher education for female residents of the NCT of Delhi. The NCWEB Centre at Maharaja Agrasen College has been active since 2011, and currently offers:

IGNOU

Maharaja Agrasen College serves as a designated study centre for both Postgraduate and Undergraduate programmes offered by the Indira Gandhi National Open University (IGNOU). A distinctive feature of the IGNOU curriculum is its Induction Program, thoughtfully designed to orient students to the distance learning model.

Centre for Performing Arts and Cultural Studies (CPACS)

Since its establishment in 2014, the Centre for Performing Arts and Cultural Studies (CPACS) has been at the forefront of promoting theatrical, multimedia, and cinematic arts through live demonstrations and immersive engagement. An unit of the Department of English, Maharaja Agrasen College, University of Delhi, CPACS actively fosters the exploration and appreciation of cultural studies and performative practices.

CPACS remained committed to bridging the gap between students and the performing arts by disseminating information about online events, workshops,





and training opportunities. It offered timely updates on accessible digital platforms and resources, including academic journals and virtual events like the MIT Press journal TDR: The Drama Review and student essay competitions—framing performing arts as a medium for resilience, healing, and shared care. The Centre continues to collaborate with a diverse range of artists and theatre practitioners, fostering a dynamic space for creative exchange.

Sanskriti Kala Kendra

The Department of Hindi at Maharaja Agrasen College proudly established the Sanskriti Kala Kendra with the vision of nurturing the holistic development of students. Beyond academic instruction, the Kendra is committed to instilling cultural sensitivity and ethical values among learners. Notably, Maharaja Agrasen College has launched a long-term educational and cultural exchange programme with Tokyo University of Foreign Studies, Tokyo, Japan—fostering international dialogue and exposure.

To further its objectives, the Centre organises a vibrant array of activities including educational trips, cultural exchange programmes, and seminars, symposia, and expert lectures on pressing socio-cultural themes. These initiatives aim to provide students with a well-rounded and enriching educational experience.

Civic Education Centre

The Civic Education Centre is dedicated to cultivating constitutional values and responsible citizenship through purposeful learning. Central to its mission is the Leadership Development Camp, alongside various civic initiatives across Delhi that encourage student leadership and active engagement.

To empower educators, the Centre develops and delivers Teacher Training Programmes in Civic Education, while also working on: Designing and implementing monitoring and evaluation mechanisms, Publishing research material, Developing standards and curriculum frameworks and Running leadership and network training programmes

Its outreach strategy involves fostering sustained collaboration with key stakeholders, including the Department of Education, schools, colleges, homes, and local government officials—to collectively strengthen India's civic fabric.

Workshops are regularly conducted to instil awareness among students about their rights and duties, and to familiarise them with the constitutional provisions that shape democratic life. The Centre also passionately advocates for social justice and environmental stewardship, engaging students and the wider community in programmes that support the restoration of natural spaces, including parks and rivers.

Gandhi Study Circle

The Gandhi Study Circle is dedicated to exploring the life, ideas, and transformative actions of Mahatma Gandhi. Committed to making Gandhian thought relevant to contemporary times, the Study Circle engages participants through a diverse array of activities held throughout the year, such as cleanliness drives, reading circles, discussion forums, quizzes, creative writing sessions, and debate competitions.

(Women Development Cell)

The Women Development Cell is an initiative dedicated to empowering women and fostering gender equality. Every year the Cell organises numerous events such as, awareness programs, health camps, and skill-building workshops, to address women's issues and promote holistic development. Through collaborations with experts and active student participation, the Cell creates a platform for dialogue, learning, and action. Environment Cell: G-वन

The Environment Cell of Maharaja Agrasen College (G-one) is dedicated to fostering environmental awareness and implementing proactive solutions to address contemporary ecological challenges. Through its diverse activities, the Cell nurtures an ethically conscious and environmentally responsible mindset among all members of the college community.

A significant achievement was realised when the College was declared a Zero Waste Campus, following successful collaborations with the Indian Pollution Control Association (IPCA) and Jaagruti Waste Paper Recyclers. These partnerships have enabled systematic waste management practices—including the handling of paper, plastic, and e-waste.

List of Documents Required for Admission

The Candidates shall be required to upload copies of the following certificates/documents at the time of registration and produce the documents in original at the time of physical verification at the end of the admissions process.

- 1. Class X Certificate (Mark-sheet or certificate) indicating date of birth and Parents' names & XII Mark-Sheet.
- 2. SC/ST/OBC/EWS/CW/KM Certificate (in the applicant's name) issued by the competent authority. (The names of applicants claiming reservation under SC/ST/OBC/EWS/CW/KM must match with the names that appear on their corresponding School Board qualifying certificates; similarly, their parents' names must match in both sets of certificates).
- 3. OBC (Non-Creamy Layer) Certificate (in the name of the applicant) issued by the competent authority, and wherein the caste is in the OBC central list issued by http://ncbc.nic.in. (The name of the applicant claiming reservation under OBC (Non-Creamy Layer) must match with the applicant's name as it appears on their corresponding School Board qualifying certificates; similarly, their parents' names must match in both sets of certificates). As stipulated, an income certificate for the financial year 2024-25, dated on or after March 31, 2025, will be required. The format of the OBC certificate is as per the DOPT certificate issued in 2014 (Appendix V of the University of Delhi, Bulletin of Information).
- 4. EWS Certificate (Appendix IV of the University of Delhi, Bulletin of Information) from competent authority certifying the applicant can claim reservation under this category. (The names of applicants claiming reservation under this category must match with the names that appear on their corresponding School Board qualifying certificates; similarly, their parents' names must match in both sets of certificates). Income certificate for the financial year 2025-26, dated on or after March 31, 2025, as stipulated, is required.

Admission Procedure

Step I: Appearing in CUET-UG 2025.

For the academic year 2025-26, admission to all UG Programs of UOD will be done based on the Common University Entrance Test- Under-Graduate 2025 (CUET (UG) – 2025.

CUET(UG) - 2025 was conducted by the National Testing Agency (NTA) in May-June 2025.

Step II: Registration in CSAS - 2025

Appearing in CUET(UG) - 2025 will not be a sufficient condition to secure a seat in Maharaja Agrasen College. For admission to the College UG Programs, a candidate has to apply in Common Seat Allocation System (CSAS-2025) of University of Delhi. Determination of program-specific eligibility and verification of documents for admission to MAC will be the sole purview of the college/university.

All applicants desirous of taking admission to Maharaja Agrasen College must give the preferences of MAC and the programs offered by the college in CSAS – 2025.

The candidate must refer to the Programs offered by MAC, their Program-Specific Eligibility Criteria, the seat matrix of each program offered by the college, fee structure and other relevant information published on the college website and the admission website of UOD before selecting the Program and College preferences.

Step II: Registration in CSAS - 2025

The CSAS -2025 form will be duly submitted only when the applicant has paid the relevant registration fee. This fee must be paid only through the link provided through the applicant's Dashboard.



Step III: Seat Allocation

The University of Delhi will provisionally allocate seats to applicants during the various allocation rounds. The applicants must 'Accept' the allocated seat and apply for admission to MAC. The college will then verify the documents and approve the admission. For details, please refer to CSAS - 2025 document available at: https://admission.uod.ac.in

Step IV: Selection of Course and College

Upon seat allocation, applicants must log in to their Dashboards to accept the program and college allocated.

- i. Please note that 'Accept' option to apply in the college as per allocated seat can be made only online through their Dashboard on the UG admissions portal. There will be no physical visit to the colleges at this point in the process.
- ii. The procedure for accepting the allocated seat by the applicant must be completed within the stipulated time period.

Step V: Online verification of documents by respective colleges

The college shall verify the documents uploaded by the applicant for the program-specific eligibility, minimum eligibility and category. Those approved are required to pay the fee and receive a confirmation of their admission.

Step VI: Payment of fees to confirm admission

Once the Principal of the College has approved their admission, the applicants will receive a link on their Dashboard through which they must submit the program fees due. This fee can only be paid online through the portal.

- i. The applicant must pay the fee without delay within the stipulated time. On successful payment of fees, the applicant is granted provisional admission to the said college.
- ii. Applicants must pay the fee within the timeframe allocated, failing which it will be concluded that the applicant is not interested in the program of study at that college, and the candidate will be out of CSAS 2025.

Step VII: Physical verification of the original documents

The respective colleges will verify the uploaded documents within the stipulated time (Dates for the same shall be announced by the University / College later). If, at this stage, it is found that the information given by the applicant is false and/or is not supported by the documents presented, the admission will be immediately cancelled. No fees will be refunded in such cases.

Any change in the admission process for CSAS – 2025 UG admission will be notified on the website of University of Delhi. Candidates applying to the University of Delhi must refer to the UG BoI-2025 for Common Minimum Eligibility criteria and Program-Specific Eligibility criteria.

If at any stage original documents relating to the admission of a candidate are found to be fake / non-genuine or fabricated or in any other manner defective, the said candidate will not be admitted. If already admitted, admission will be cancelled without any prior notice in this regard. If the same is found after completing the program, his / her degree will be cancelled and appropriate legal action will be taken.

Qualifying Examinations:

Qualifying examinations for admission to the first year of undergraduate programs offered by the University of Delhi shall be Senior Secondary School Certificate Examination (Class XII) of the Central Board of Secondary Education or an examination recognized as equivalent

Age Requirement:

As per Ordinance-I of the University of Delhi, there is no minimum age bar for admission for the courses offered by the college.

UNIVERSITY ORDINANCES REGARDING CONDUCT AND DISCIPLINE

ORDINANCE XV-B: Maintenance of Discipline among Students of the University

- 1. All powers relating to discipline and disciplinary actions are vested in the Vice-Chancellor.
- 2. The Vice-Chancellor may delegate all or such powers as he/she deems proper to the Proctor and to such other persons as he/she may specify in this behalf.
- 3. Without prejudice to the generality of power to enforce discipline under the Ordinance the following shall amount to acts of gross indiscipline:
 - a. Physical assault, or threat to use physical force, against any member of the teaching and non-teaching staff of any Institution/Department and against any student within the University of Delhi
 - a. Carrying of, use of or threat to use of any weapons
 - b. Any violation of the provisions of the Civil Rights Protection Act, 1976
 - c. Violation of the status, dignity and honour of students belonging to the scheduled castes and tribes.
 - d. Any practice-whether verbal or otherwise-derogatory of women.
 - e. Any attempt at bribing or corruption in any manner.
 - f. Wilful destruction of institutional property.
 - g. Creating ill-will or intolerance on religious or communal grounds.
 - h. Causing disruption in any manner of the academic functioning of the University system.
 - . Prohibition of Ragging as per Ordinance XV-C.
- 2. Without prejudice to the generality of his/her powers relating to the maintenance of discipline and taking such action in the interest of maintaining discipline as may seem to him/her appropriate, the Vice-Chancellor, may in the exercise of his/her powers aforesaid order or direct that any student or students:
 - a. be expelled; or\
 - a. be, for a stated period rusticated; or
 - b. be not for a stated period, admitted to a course or courses of study in a College, Department, or Institution of the University; or

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- c. be fined with a sum of rupees that may be specified; or
- d. be debarred from taking a university or College or Departmental Examination or Examination for one or more years; or
- e. that the result of the student or students concerned in the examination or Examinations in which he/she or they have appeared be cancelled.
- 2. The Principals of the Colleges, Heads of the Halls, Deans of Faculties, Heads of Teaching Departments in the University, the Principal, School of Open Learning and Librarians shall have the authority to exercise all such disciplinary powers over students in their respective Colleges, Institutions, Faculties and Teaching Departments in the University as may be necessary for the proper conduct of the Institutions, Halls and teaching in the concerned Departments. They may exercise their authority through, or delegate authority to such of the teachers in their Colleges, Institutions or Departments as they may specify for these purposes.
- 3. Without prejudice to the powers of the Vice-Chancellor and the Proctor as aforesaid, detailed ruled of discipline and proper conduct shall be framed.
- 4. These rules may be supplemented, where necessary, by the Principals of Colleges, Heads of Halls, Deans of Faculties and Heads of Teaching Departments in this University. Each student shall be expected provide himself/herself with a copy of these rules.
- 5. At the time of admission, every student shall be required to sign a declaration that on admission he/she submits himself/ herself to the disciplinary jurisdiction of the Vice-Chancellor and several authorities of the University who may be vested with the authority to exercise discipline under the Acts, the Statutes, the Ordinances and the rules that have been framed therein by the University.

ORDINANCE XV-C: Prohibition and Punishment for Ragging

- 1. Ragging in any form is strictly prohibited, within the premises of College/Department or Institution and any part of Delhi University system as well as on public transport.
- 2. Any individual or collective act or practice of ragging constitutes gross indiscipline and shall be dealt with under this Ordinance.
- 3. Ragging for the purposes of this Ordinance, ordinarily means any act, conduct or practice by which dominant power or status of senior students is brought to bear on students freshly enrolled or students who are in any way considered junior or inferior by other students; and includes individual or collective acts or practices which-Involve physical assault or threat to use of physical force
 - a. Violate the status, dignity and honour of women students
 - b. Violate the status, dignity and honour of students belonging to the scheduled caste and tribe
 - c. Expose students to ridicule and contempt and affect their self-esteem
 - d. Entail verbal abuse and aggression, indecent gestures and obscene behaviour.
- 2. The Principal of a College, the Head of the Department or an Institution, the authorities of College, or University Hostel or Halls of Residence shall take immediate action on any information of the occurrence of ragging.
- 3. Notwithstanding anything in Clause (4) above, the Proctor may also suomoto enquire into any incident of ragging and make a report to the Vice-Chancellor of the identity of those who have engaged in ragging and the nature of the incident.
- 4. The Proctor may also submit an initial report establishing the identity of the perpetrators of ragging and the nature of the ragging incident.
- 5. If the Principal of a College or Head of the Department or Institution or the Proctor is satisfied that for some reason, to be recorded in writing, it is not reasonably practical to hold such an enquiry, he/she may so advise the Vice-Chancellor accordingly.
- 6. When the Vice-Chancellor is satisfied that it is not expedient to hold such an enquiry, his/her decision shall be final.
- 7. On the receipt of a report under Clause (5) or (6) or a determination by the relevant authority under clause (7) disclosing the occurrence of ragging incidents described in Clause 3(a), (b) and (c), the Vice-Chancellor shall direct or order rustication of a student or students for a specific number of years.



- The Vice-Chancellor may in other cases of ragging order or direct that any student or students be expelled or be not for a stated period, admitted to a course of study in a college, departmental examination for one or more years or that the results of the student or students concerned in the examination or examinations in which they appeared be cancelled.
- In case any students who have obtained degrees or diplomas of Delhi University are found guilty; under this Ordinance, appropriate action will be taken under Statute 15 for withdrawal of degrees or diploma conferred by the University.
- 10. For the purpose of this Ordinance, abetment to ragging whether by way of any act, practice or incitement of ragging will also amount to ragging.
- 11. All Institutions within the Delhi University system shall be obligated to carry out instruction/directions issued under this Ordinance, and to give aid assistance to the Vice-Chancellor to achieve the effective implementation of the Ordinance.

Note: Order of the Vice-Chancellor in pursuance of Ordinance XV-C:

Where incident (s) of ragging are reported to the Vice-Chancellor by any authority under this Ordinance, the students (s) involved in ragging, shall be expelled for a specified term, designated in the order. Non-students involved in reports of ragging will be proceeded with under the criminal law of India; they will also be rendered ineligible for period of five years from seeking enrolment in any of the institutions of the University of Delhi. Students against whom necessary action is taken under this note, will be given post decisional hearing, with strict adherence to the rules of natural justice.

ORDINANCE XV-D/The Sexual Harassment of Women at Workplace (Prevention, Prohibition and Redressal) Act, 2013

An Act to provide protection against sexual harassment of women at workplace and for the prevention and redressal of complaints of sexual harassment and for matters connected therewith incidental thereto.

WHEREAS sexual harassment results in violation of the fundamental rights of a woman to equality under articles 14 and 15 of the Constitution of India and her right to life and to live with dignity under article 21http://www.shebox.nic.in/assets/site/ main/images/Sexual-Harassment-at-Workplace-Act.pdf. of the Constitution and right to practice any profession or to carry on any occupation, trade or business which includes a right to a safe environment free from sexual harassment.

AND WHEREAS the protection against sexual harassment and the right to work with dignity are universally recognized human rights by international conventions and instruments such as Convention on the Elimination of all forms of discrimination against Women, which has been ratified on the 25th June, 1993 by the Government of India.

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AND WHEREAS it is expedient to make provisions for giving effect to the said Convention for protection of women against sexual harassment at workplace.

Section 9 - Complaint of sexual harassment

1. Any aggrieved woman may make in writing a complaint of sexual harassment at workplace to the Internal Committee within a period of three months from the date of incident and in case of a series of incidents within a period of three months from the date of last incident:

Provided that where such complaint cannot be made in writing, the Presiding officer or any member of the Internal Committee shall render all reasonable assistance to the woman for making the complaint in writing:

Provided further that the Internal Committee may for the reasons to be recorded in writing, extend the time limit not exceeding three months, if it is satisfied that the circumstances were such which prevented the woman from filing a complaint within the said period.

Where the aggrieved woman is unable to make a complaint on account of her physical or mental incapacity or death or otherwise, her legal heir or such other person as may be prescribed may make a complaint under this section.

Section 14 - Punishment for false or malicious complaint and false evidence.

1. Where the Internal Committee arrives at a conclusion that the allegation against the respondents is malicious or the aggrieved woman or any other person making the complaint has made the complaint knowing it to be false or the aggrieved woman or any other person making the complaint has produced any forged or misleading document, it may recommend to the employer or the District Officer as the case may be to take action against the woman or the person who has made the complaint under sub-section (1) or sub-section (2) of section 9 as the case may be, in accordance with the provisions of the service rules applicable to her or him or where no such service rules exist, in such manner as may be prescribed:

Provided that a mere inability to substantiate a complaint or provide adequate proof need not attract action against the complainant under this section:

Provided further that the malicious intent on parts of the complainant shall be established after an inquiry in accordance with the procedure prescribed, before any action is recommended.

Where the Internal Committee arrives at a conclusion that during the inquiry any witness has given false evidence or produced any forged or misleading document, it may recommend to the employer of the witness or the District Officer as the case may be to take action in accordance with the provisions of the service rules applicable to the said witness or where no such service rules exist in such manner as may be prescribed.

For further details, please see the website http: indiacode.nic.in/acts-in-pdf/142013.pdf. Redress of Grievance of Students As per UGC notification dated 6.5.19, grievance means complaints made by an aggrieved student in report of the following:

Admission contrary to merit determined in accordance with the declared admission policy of the institution.

- i. Irregularity in the process under the declared admission policy of the institution.
- ii. Refusal admit in accordance with the declared admission policy of the institution.
- iii. Non-publication of prospectus by the institution in accordance with the provisions of these regulations.
- iv. Publication by the institution of any information in the prospectus, which is false or misleading and not based on facts.
- v. Withholding of, or refusal to return, any document in the form of certificates or degree, diploma or any other award or other document deposited by a student for the purpose of seeking admission in such institution, with a view to induce or compel such student to pay any fee or fees in respect or any course or program of study which such student does not intend to pursue.
- vi. Demand of money in excess of that specified to be charged in the declared admission policy of the institution.
- vii. Violation by the institution or any law for the time being in force to regard to reservation of seats in admission to different category of students.
- viii. Non-payment or delay in payment of scholarships or financial aid admissible to any students under the declared admission policy of such institution, or under the conditions, if any, prescribed by the Commission.



- ix. Delay by the institution in the conduct or examinations, or declaration of results, beyond the schedule specified in the academic calendar of the institution, or in such calendar prescribed by the Commission.
- x. Failure by the institution to provide student amenities as set out in the prospectus or is required to be extended by the institution under any provisions of law for the time being in force.
- xi. Non-transparent or unfair practices adopted by the institution for the evaluation of students.
- xii. Delay in, or denial of, the refund of fees due to a student who withdraws admission within the time mentioned in the prospectus or as may be notified by the Commission.
- xiii. Complaints of alleged discrimination of students from the Scheduled Caste, the Scheduled Tribes, Other Backward Classes, Women Minority or persons with disabilities categories.
- xiv. Denial of quality education as promised at the time of admission or required to be provided
- xv. Harassment or victimization of a student, other than cases of harassment, which are to be proceeded against under the penal provisions of any law for the time being in force. An aggrieved student may contact the Grievance redressal committee.

Attendance and Examination Related Rules

a. A candidate for the Semester I/III/V Examination shall not be deemed to have satisfied the required conditions of attendance unless he has attended, in all the subjects taken together, not less than two-thirds of the lectures/practical/presentations/tutorials required to be attended provided that a student of the Semester I/III/V who does not fulfil the required conditions of attendance, as above, but has attended, in all the subjects taken together, not less than 40 per cent of lectures/practical/presentations during the respective semester, may at the discretion of the Principal of the College concerned, appear for the ensuing semester Examination; but such a candidate shall be required to make up the deficiency at lectures and practical's, in the next semester of the same academic year.

Provided that a student of the II/IV/VI semester who does not fulfil the required conditions of attendance as above, but has attended in all the subjects taken together, not less than 40 per cent of the lectures/practical/presentation/tutorials, held during the respective semester, may at the discretion of the college Principal, be allowed to appear at the ensuing examination provided that s/he makes up the deficiency of the said attendance by combining the attendance of the previous semester in the ensuing semester.

Provided further that the Principal of the College concerned may permit a student to appear in an examination notwithstanding that the student has not fulfilled the attendance requirement, if in the opinion of the Principal, such student shall make up the deficiency in the succeeding academic year.

Provided further that a student of the II/IV/VI semester shall be allowed to appear at the II/IV/VI Semester Examination, as the case may be, if by combining the attendance of the one/two/three academic years as the case may be, the candidate has put in two-thirds of attendance, in all the subjects taken together, held during the respective years.

- b. In the case of a student who is selected as a member of the N.C.C to participate in the annual N.C.C. Camps or is deputed to undertake Civil Defence work and allied duties or in the case of a student who is enrolled in the National Service Scheme and is deputed to various public assignments by or with the approval of the Principal/ Head of the institution concerned or a student who is selected to participate in sports or other activities organized by the Inter-University Board or in national or international fixtures in games and sports approved by the Competent Authority or a student who is required to represent the University at the Inter-University Youth Festival, or a student who is required to participate in periodical training in the Territorial Army or a student who is deputed by the College to take part in Inter College sports or fixtures, debates, seminars, symposia or social work projects or a student who is required curricular activities held in other Universities or such other activities approved by the Principal/Vice-Chancellor for this purpose. In calculating the total number of lectures etc. delivered in the College, or in the University as the case may be, for his course of study in each academic year, the number of lectures etc. in each subject delivered, during the period of absence and as approved by the principal for that purpose shall deemed to have been attended by the student.
- a. The Principal of a College may consider, on the basis of the Medical Certificates produced, exceptionally hard cases of students who had fallen seriously ill or had met with an accident during the year disabling them from attending classes for a certain period, with a view to determining whether the lectures etc. delivered during the said period, or a part thereof, could be excluded for purposes of calculation of attendance of the year and decide each case on its own merits.
- a. Colleges shall be required to notify the attendance position of each of its students for each month on the notice board of the College, and clearly indicate the lectures/practical hold subject wise and the numbers attended by each student. a. A College shall notify on the notice board the final attendance position of each of its students within five days of the dispersal of the classes in the last session of the academic year not later than five days, thereafter, a student may, by and application to the principal of the college claim benefit of exclusion of lectures under sub-clause (a) above on grounds to be specified and accompanied by the relevant documents. All such applications submitted within time shall be considered and disposed of by the Principal of the College at least 3 days prior to the commencement of the examination, in which the student intends to appear. a. The benefit of exclusion of lectures contemplated in para 'c' above shall in no case exceed 1/3 of the total number of lectures practical's/presentations / tutorials d elivered.
- a. In the case of a married woman student who is granted maternally leave, in calculating the total number of lectures delivered in the College or in the University. As the case may be, for her course of study in each semester, the number of lectures in each subject delivered during the period of her maternity leave shall not be taken in to account.
- a. No person shall be deemed to have satisfied the required conditions in respect of his instructions, unless in addition to the requirements regarding attendance and other conditions, he has appeared and satisfied by his performance the Principal of

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the College in such tests, written and / or oral, as may be held by him in his discretion. The Principal of the College Shall have and shall be deemed always to have had, the power to detain a student in the same class in which he has been studying, or not to send him up for the University Examination, in case he did not appear at the tests aforesaid or his performance was not satisfactory. The Principal of a College/ Head of the Institution shall have power to strike off the name of a student who is grossly irregular in attendance inspite of warning, or when the absence of the student is for such a long period that he cannot put in requisite percentage of attendance.

ORDINANCE VIII (2)

For all the students obtaining admissions under the Three Year Under-graduate programme under CBCS, the span period to complete the course will be 6 years from the year of admission in the first semester, irrespective of the different courses provided the student has completed all requirements to become eligible for appearing in the University Examinations as per rules.

ORDINANCE VIII (2)

For all the students obtaining admissions under the Three Year Under-graduate programme under CBCS, the span period to complete the course will be 6 years from the year of admission in the first semester, irrespective of the different courses provided the student has completed all requirements to become eligible for appearing in the University Examinations as per rules.

ORDINANCE IX Pass Percentage and Promotion Rules

- a. A student who appears in an odd semester examination or who was eligible to appear in the odd semester examinations but remains absent in any or all the papers of the said semester, shall move on to the next even semester irrespective of his/her result in the said examinations.
- d. If a student has secured an aggregate of minimum 40% marks taking together all the papers in theory examination (including internal assessment/project, wherever applicable) and practical exam separately till the end of third year, i.e., upto the end of the VIth semester, then she/he shall be awarded the degree in which the student has been admitted.
- e. A student who wants to re-appear for improvement in marks in a paper prescribed for semester I/III/V may do so only in the semester examinations to be held in November-December. A student who want to re-appear for improvement in a paper prescribed in semester II/IV/VI may do so only in the examinations to be held in May/June.



Re-appearance for improvement

- a. A student may re-appear in any theory paper prescribed for a semester, on foregoing in writing her his previous performance in the paper/s concerned. This can be done in the immediate subsequent semester examination only (for example, a student re-appearing in paper prescribed for Semester I examination may do so along with subsequent Semester IIIrd examination and not along with papers for semester Vth). a. A candidate who has cleared examinations of third academic year (Vth and Vith semesters) may re-appear in any paper of V or VI semester only once, at the immediate subsequent examinations on foregoing in writing her/his previous performance in the paper/s concerned, within the prescribed span period. (Note: The candidate of this category will not be allowed to join any post-graduate courses)
- c. In the case of re-appearance in paper, the result will be prepared on the basis of candidate's current performance in the examinations.
- In the case of a candidate, who opts to re-appear in any paper/s under the aforesaid provisions, on surrendering her/his earlier performance but fails to reappear in the paper/s concerned, the marks previously secured by the candidate in the paper/s in which she/he has failed to re-appear shall be taken into account while determining her/his result of the examination held currently.
- All papers of Core, Elective, Ability Enhancement Compulsory Courses (AECC) and Skill Enhancement Courses (SEC) shall be for 100 marks each and 25 marks shall be for Internal Assessment (IA).
- Examination for Practical wherever applicable shall be based on continuous evaluation.
- Duration of end semester theory examinations of Core and Elective subjects shall be three hours.
- There shall be no internal assessment in practical papers.
- There shall be no supplementary examinations.
- The use of dishonest or unfair mean in the examination include: Assisting in any manner whatsoever any other candidate in answering the question paper during the course of the examination:
- Taking assistance from any other candidate of any other person or from any book, paper, note or other material in answering the question paper during the course of the examination.
- •. Carrying into the examination room any book, paper, notes, or other material whatsoever likely to be used directly or indirectly by the candidate in connection with the examination.
- Smuggling in an answer book of a continuation sheet.
- Taking out or arranging to send out an answer book or its any page or a continuation sheet.
- Replacing or getting replaced an answer book or its any page or continuation sheet during or after the examination.
- Getting impersonated by any person in examination.
- Deliberately disclosing one's identity or making any distinctive mark in the answer book for that purpose.
- •. Communicating with or talking to any other candidate or unauthorized person in or around the examination room during the course of the examination.
- Communicating or attempting to communicate directly or through a relative, guardian and find with an examiner with the object of influencing him in the award of marks.
- b. Disorderly conduct in the examination includes:
 - .Misbehaviour in connection with the examination, with the Superintendent, the Invigilator on duty or the other staff working at the Examination Centre, or with any other candidate in or around the examination centre, before, during or after the examination hour.
- Leaving the examination room before the expiry of half an hour or without handing over the answer book to the invigilator -in-charge or without signing the attendance sheet.
- Intentionally tearing off the answer book or a part there for a continuation sheet,
- Disturbing or disrupting the examination.
- Inciting others to leave the examination room or to disturb or disrupt the examination.
- Carrying into the examination centre any weapon of offence.
- c. No. candidate shall make use of any dishonest or unfair means or indulge in disorderly conduct in the examination.
- A candidate found guilty of the use of dishonest or unfair means or disorderly conduct in the examination may be disqualified
 from passing the examination for which he was a candidate, and may, in addition, be debarred from appearing at any future
 examination of the university for a further period to be stated or be expelled from the University and declared not a fit and
 proper person to be admitted to any further examination of the university.



Internal Assessment Rules

Annexure-80 Item No. 4-1 (4-1-18)

Annexure-1

- 1. The assessment pattern that shall be adopted for the purpose of assessment of courses that have been approved by the competent authorities under the UGCF 2022 shall be as follows:
- (a) In any course where 01 credit is attributed to 'Tutorial', an objective assessment process has to be developed as a credit earned by a student in a course will eventually lead to its deposition in the Academic Bank of Credit of such student. Therefore, it is imperative that each credit earned by a student is adequately assessed and recorded accordingly.
- (b) In view of the above, the components of Tutorial have been listed so that at least some of these activities (listed at point no. 3 below) may be picked up by a student, in consultation with the teacher, as per rules devised for this purpose. The activities conducted shall be assessed through continuous assessment.
 - (i) Some of the activities that may be done as component of tutorials are as follows:
 - Literature review
 - Book review
 - Movie review
 - Project activity (group)
 - Research cum presentation
 - Creative Writing/Paper writing
 - Group discussion
 - Problem Solving exercises
 - Any creative production (may be done in a group)
 - Innovative Project
 - Any other scholastic work related to application of conceptual understanding of the subject.
 - (ii) Further, out of forty marks allocated for Continuous Assessment of tutorial, five marks shall be for attendance, which shall be distributed as follows:
 - a. More than 67% attendance but less than 70% attendance 1 mark
 - b. More than 70% attendance but less than 75% attendance 2 marks
 - c. More than 75% attendance but less than 80 % attendance 3 marks
 - d. More than 80% attendance but less than 85% attendance 4 marks
 - e. More than 85 % attendance 5 marks

There shall **not** be marks for attendance in Continuous Assessments for practical.

2. (i) Internal Assessment (IA) shall consist of marks secured in class tests, assignments/ presentations and attendance. For instance, for an Internal Assessment of 25 marks, Class tests shall comprise of 10 marks, Assignments/Presentations/Project/ Activity done as component of the Tutorial shall comprise of 10 marks and attendance shall be for 5 marks.



Similarly, for IA of 30 marks, 6 marks shall be for attendance, 12 marks for class test and 12 marks for Assignments/Presentations/Project/ Activity.

- (ii) Six marks for attendance shall be distributed as follows:
- (a) More than 67% attendance but less than 70% attendance 1.2 mark
- (b) More than 70% attendance but less than 75% attendance 2.4 marks
- (c) More than 75% attendance but less than 80 % attendance 3.6 marks
- (d) More than 80% attendance but less than 85% attendance 4.8 marks
- (e) More than 85 % attendance

- 6.0 marks
- 3. (i) To make Internal Assessment and Continuous Assessment fair and reasonable, it is necessary to strengthen the Monitoring Committee for Internal Assessment in every College, constituted as per clause 5 (ii) of Ordinance VIII-E of the Ordinances of the University. This Committee shall be responsible for the entire process of Internal Assessment in the College, including redressal of grievances, if any. The same Committee shall also look into the process of Continuous Assessment and redress grievances, if any.
 - (ii) A student who is discontent with the decision taken by the Monitoring Committee for Internal Assessment of the College, with respect to the grievance submitted by him/her relating to Internal Assessment/Continuous Assessment, may file an appeal before an appellate body consisting of the Principal of the College, the Teacher-incharge of the department/senior faculty member, the concerned teacher who has assessed the aggrieved student and shall be chaired by the Nominee of Dean of Colleges or Director South Delhi Campus, under whose jurisdiction the concerned College falls.
- 4. The theory examination and internal assessment shall be a cumulative assessment of the teaching-learning done in the theory as well as tutorial classes.
- 5. The assessment pattern for courses of different credit distributions is provided in Table -1.
- 6. Practical marks for courses of total four credits, shall comprise of
 - (i) continuous evaluation (25%),
 - (ii) end term practical examination (50%) and
 - (iii) viva-voce (25%).

Practical marks for courses of total two credits shall comprise of

- (i) continuous evaluation (50%),
- (ii) End term practical /written exam (25%) and
- (iii) viva-voce (25%)
- 7. The variance of the total marks in various combinations of LTP structure shall be aligned with the help of "weighted average" calculated through an appropriately devised formula for conversion of marks to grades.



- 8. "The attendance requirement for continuous mode of assessment shall be as per Ordinance VII of the Ordinances of the University".
- 9. To enable students to improve their grades, the following may be adopted:

VAC/SEC/GE/DSE/IAPCO GUIDELINES

Students must select one option from VAC/SEC/GE from among the options offered by the college.

- Kindly note that GE options must be selected from other than core courses. For eg: a student of English Honours cannot select a GE Paper offered by the English department.
- GE options have to be selected semester wise. A student of semester I will only select their options from Semester I pool.
- There shall be choice in III and IV Semesters to choose either one 'SEC' or in the alternative Internship/ Apprenticeship/ Project/Community Outreach' in each Semester for two credits each.
- ** There shall be choice in Semester III and IV to either choose a DSE or a GE.
- ***There shall be choice in V and VI Semesters to choose either one 'SEC' or in the alternative Internship/ Apprenticeship/ Project/Research/Community Outreach' in each Semester for two credits each.
- # There shall be four choices in VII and VIII Semesters -
 - (i) to choose three DSEs of 4 credits each OR
 - (ii) to choose two DSEs and one GE of 4 credits each OR
 - (iii) to choose one DSE and two GEs of 4 credits each OR
 - (iv) to choose three GEs of 4 credits each.

'Research Methodology' shall be offered as one of the GE courses in VI and VII Semesters. Students can opt for it either in VI semester or VII semester. However, students pursuing multidisciplinary studies in three core disciplines shall have tochoose research methodology in VI semester, if she/he wishes to Major in one of the three disciplines in the fourth year. - **Practical Training:** A strong emphasis is placed on hands-on learning. Through laboratory sessions, students gain proficiency in designing, constructing, and testing circuits and systems using electronic components, measurement tools, and simulation platforms.
- Research and Industry Exposure: In the fourth year, students undertake a research dissertation, allowing them to explore a
 topic of personal interest under faculty supervision. Additionally, internships and project work provide valuable exposure to realworld applications, reinforcing conceptual knowledge through experiential learning.

Beyond technical skills like circuit design, prototyping, and data analysis, the program fosters abilities in problem-solving, teamwork, communication, and professional development—making graduates well-equipped for diverse opportunities in the electronics domain.







B. Sc. Physical Sciences

The undergraduate degree course in Physical Sciences aims to provide an in-depth knowledge in three disciplines of sciences through understanding of key concepts, principles, theories related to the three disciplines. At Maharaja Agrasen College, two courses under Physical Sciences are offered. These include

- B.Sc. Physical Science with Chemistry This programme provides exposure to the latest advances in chemistry, physics, mathematics and research.
- B.Sc.PhysicalSciencewithComputerScience-Thisprogrammeprovidesexposuretothelatestadvancesincomputersciences, physics, mathematics and research.

The entire structure allows the learners to enhance their skills that are needed to form building blocks to pursue their career in emerging areas of Science, Engineering, Defence, Space etc. The course serves as springboard for research in emerging areas such as Nuclear and High energy Physics, Quantum computing, Astrophysics, Computational Physics, Cosmology, Complex Networks, Biophysics, Biotechnology, Green Chemistry etc. Both the programmes enable students to prepare for various competitive exams, such as IIT-JAM, GATE, GRE, UGC-CSIR NET/JRF and Civil Services Examinations.

As per the recommendations of UGCF 2022, the undergraduate degree course in Physical Sciences is a six/ eight-semester course spread over three/ four academic years. The teaching learning process is student-centric, and it involves both theory and practical components. It offers a flexibility of programme structure while ensuring that the student gets a strong foundation in the subject and gains in-depth knowledge. Besides the DSCs (Discipline Specific Core Courses) of three different disciplines, a student can opt courses from the syllabus comprising of DSEs, GEs (Generic Electives), AECs (Ability Enhancement Courses), SECs (Skill Enhancement Courses) and VACs (Value Addition Courses). Thereby, bringing out the multidisciplinary approach and adherence to innovative ways within the curriculum framework.
